

MÓDULO 03 - HANG UP

DEFINITION

HANG UP

- 1) to hang something on a hook or hanger
- 2) to end a phone call

HANG UP is SEPARABLE

HANG is an IRREGULAR VERB HANG – HUNG/HANGED – HUNG/HANGED

EXAMPLES AND EXPLANATIONS

1) to hang something on a hook or hanger

1. Present tense

As soon as we get home after work, we *hang up* our shirts, so they don't get wrinkled.

- as soon as = the moment that
 - o Call me as soon as you get home.
- As (adjective/adverb) as = tão (adjetivo/adverbio) quanto
 - o I'm as tall as you.
 - o I'm not as tall as you.
 - o Charlie is as fast as Mike.
 - o Charlie is NOT as fast as Mike.

2. Present continuous

Max is on the **roof** *hanging up* the Christmas lights.

- Roof = outside (on top of the house)
- Ceiling = inside the house or building

3. Past simple

Peter *hung up* his **gym shoes** to dry in the laundry room.

- ✓ Gym shoes; tennis shoes; sneakers
- ✗ Tennis

4. Past continuous

When I *was hanging up* my **dress**, I saw there was a stain on it.

- Dress = to put clothes on (to put clothes on)
 - o I showered and dressed quickly. (formal)
 - o I took a shower and got dressed quickly. (informal and more common)
- Dress = what you wear (noun)
 - o I love your dress!

5. Used to

Johnny never *used to hang up* his **laundry**, but now he always does it.

- Laundry = clean or dirty clothes (dirty laundry; clean laundry)

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2) Hang up – to end a call (phone call, skype call, etc.)

6. First conditional

If you yell at me, I *will hang up* the phone.

7. Present perfect continuous + present perfect

She has been yelling at him on the phone for over an hour, but he **still** *hasn't hung up*.

- Still = “ainda” for things that started in the past and continue to the present
 - o Mark is still sick.
 - o Do you still volunteer at the hospital?

8. Past simple with “about to”

Heather was *about to hang up* the Skype call when her student asked her another question.

9. Conditionals

I'm not **supposed to** be on my phone now. So, if my boss walks in, I'm **gonna** *hang up*, okay?

- supposed to = should
- not supposed to = shouldn't
 - o You're supposed to go to the dentist every year. = You should go to the dentist every year.
 - o You're not supposed to do that. = You shouldn't do that.
- gonna (informal contraction) of “going to” before a verb
 - o I'm gonna travel tomorrow = I'm going to travel tomorrow.
 - o The students are gonna take a test this afternoon. = The students are going to take a test this afternoon.
 - ✗ I'm ~~gonna~~ Italy tomorrow.
 - ✗ I'm ~~gonna~~ the store. (Only use “gonna” before verbs, not nouns)

10. Modals (might)

The connection is **kind of (kinda)** bad, so I might *hang up* on you accidentally.

- kinda = kind of (a little)
 - o - “Do you speak Italian?” - “Kinda. I've only been studying a for a few months.”
 - o - “Did you like the movie?” - “Uhhh... kinda. It was okay.”
