PRESENT PERFECT X PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS

WHEN DO WE USE THE PRESENT PERFECT CONTINU-OUS?

We use the **Present Perfect Continuous** to talk about something that started in the past and continues to the present moment, usually with a duration of time.

STRUCTURE:

Subject + has/have + been + present participle (-ING form of the verb)

• Most non-action verbs are not used in any continuous tense, which includes the present perfect continuous tense. (ex: know, hear, believe, cost)

HOW TO MAKE SENTENCES AND QUESTIONS IN THE "PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS"

AFFIRMATIVE SENTENCES:

Subject + has/have + been + gerund

- Ex. We have (We've) been waiting in this line for over an hour.
- Ex. We have been living here for over 10 years.
- Ex. Kevin and I have been working for this company since 2005.
- Ex. Maggie has been working all day.

NEGATIVE SENTENCES:

Subject + has/have + not + been + gerund

- Ex. Sally has not (hasn't) been feeling well this whole week.
- Ex. We haven't been feeling well since Monday.
- Ex. I haven't been studying very much.
- Ex. My computer hasn't been working all week.

INTERROGATIVE SENTENCES (QUESTIONS):

Have/Has + subject + been + gerund...?

- Ex. How long has the baby been sleeping?
- Ex. How long have you been waiting in this line?
- Ex. Has the baby been sleeping all this time?
- Ex. How long have the neighbors been arguing like this?



^{*}has + not = hasn't

^{*}have + not = haven't

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PRESENT PERFECT VS. PRESENT PERFECT CONTINU-OUS:

SOMETIMES THEY HAVE THE SAME MEANINGS

EXAMPLES:

- 1. Robert <u>has worked</u> for this company since he was 18 years old. (present perfect) = Robert <u>has been working</u> for this company since he was 18 years old. (present perfect continuous)
- 2. Gabriel <u>has played</u> soccer his entire life. (present perfect) = Gabriel <u>has been playing</u> soccer his entire life. (present perfect continuous)
- 3. I'<u>ve studied</u> English for 5 years. (present perfect) = I'<u>ve been studying</u> English for 5 years. (present perfect continuous)
- 4. l'<u>ve lived in Brazil</u> for 8 years. (present perfect) = l'<u>ve been living</u> in Brazil for 8 years. (present perfect continuous)
- 5. Will <u>has gone</u> to school ever since he was 5 years old. (present perfect) = Will <u>has been going</u> to school ever since he was 5 years old. (present perfect continuous)
- 6. l'<u>ve worn</u> glasses nearly my whole life. (present perfect) = l'<u>ve been wearing</u> glasses nearly my whole life. (present perfect continuous)

SOMETIMES THEY HAVE DIFFERENT MEANINGS

EXAMPLES:

1. I have (I've) talked to my mom several times this week. (present perfect - I'm not talking at the moment)

We have (We've) been talking on the phone for over 2 hours. (present perfect continuous – I'm still talking to my mom at the present moment)

2. The boys have played video games before. (present perfect – They are not playing at the moment, but they have played before)

The boys have been playing video games all day. (present perfect continuous - They are still playing)

3. The students have taken 5 tests so far this year. (present perfect – They are not taking a test right now)

The students have been taking a test for over an hour. (present perfect continuous - They started over an hour ago and are still taking the test)



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- 4. We'<u>ve watched</u> this show before. (present perfect We watched this show in the past) We'<u>ve been watching</u> this show all day. (present perfect continuous We are still watching the show)
- 5. I'<u>ve worked</u> for this company for nearly 15 years. (present perfect I started 15 years ago and I still work for this company)

l'<u>ve been working</u> all day. I'm really tired. (present perfect continuous – I've been actively working all day and I'm still working)

REVIEW:

We use the **Present Perfect Continuous** to talk about something that started in the past and continuous to the present moment, usually with a duration of time.

Question:

What have you been doing for the past 15 minutes?

• Possible answers: I have been studying English. / I've been watching this video. / I've been learning about the present perfect continuous tense.

Remember: Most non-action verbs are not used in any continuous tense, which includes the present perfect continuous tense. (ex: know, hear, believe, cost)

Examples:

- 1. I've known Mary for 3 years.
- I've been knowing Mary for 3 years.
- "Know" is a non-action verb, so you can't say "knowing")
- * Another possibility is to say: "I am getting to know Mary" if you are in the process of figuring out who she is, etc.
- 2. I've had a cold for the past two weeks.

I've been having a cold for the past two weeks.

- "Have" is a non-action verb when used to describe possession
- * You can say: "I've been having a great time this entire trip." (In this example, "have" is being used to describe a condition)
- 3. I've always believed in you.

l've always been believing.

"Believe" is a non-action verb, you can't say "believing"

- 1. Yes, I have. I fell down the stairs yesterday.
- 2. No. I haven't.
- 3. Yes, I have. I've ridden a camel several times.
- 4. Yes, I have. I've taken many French classes.
- 5. Yes, I have. I wrote a poem for my English class last year.
- 6. No, I haven't. I've lost every bet I made.
- 7. Yes, I sat in gum yesterday.
- 8. Yes, I had a nightmare last night.
- 9. No, I haven't broken any bones.
- 10. No, I haven't.
