# PRESENT PERFECT

It is used when the action is more important than the time. You emphasize what happened does not matter when it happened.

If the time is important in the sentence you should use simple past.

I have lost my keys (no specific time)

I lost my keys today (specific time)

She has watched the movie with us (the action is important no matter when)

She watched the movie with us last night.

Have they done their homework?

Have you bought a new house?

Has he cleaned his bedroom?

EVER	NEVER
USED WITH PRE	ESENT PERFECT
Ever means 'at any time', the specific time is unknown or unnecessary, and is used in questions.  Have you ever met a famous person?  (Did you meet a famous person at any time in the past.)	Never is originally a contraction of 'not ever'.
Ever is also used with nothing, nobody for things that haven't happened before.  Nobody has ever travelled through time.	Never means the subject hasn't had a certain experience before.  Have you ever been abroad? No, I've never been abroad.  (I've never had that experience before.)
Ever is also used with 'the first time' for first experiences.  This is the first time I've ever eaten snake soup.	Never can be used in negative questions to show the surprise that you've never had a certain experience before.  Have you never played soccer?

# **Examples:**

Have you ever eaten this fruit?

No, I have never eaten it before.

Has she ever traveled to Africa?

Yes, she has already gone there.

Have they ever talked to her?

No, they have never seen her at the office.

# Just, already, and yet - Present Perfect

# \*Just (a short time ago)

A: Are Mary and Martha in the building?

B: Yes, they've just arrived.

A: Are you thirsty?

B: No, I've just drunk water.

# \*Already (before the expected)

A: What are your children coming?

B: They've already arrived.

A: It's only 6 P.M., and Peter has already gone to bed. A: Diane, this is Paul.

B: Yes, I know. We've already met.

# \*Yet (negative sentences)

A: Are your students here?

B: No, they haven't arrived yet. or No, they didn't arrive yet.

A: Does he know that you're going home?

B: No, I haven't told him yet.

# **WOULD RATHER:**

specific preference (I'd rather buy a chocolate cake for my birthday party)

Prefer and would rather are both used for expressing our preference.

They have the samemeaning, but their grammar forms and rules are different from each other.

- My father would rather drink tea than (drink) coffee.
- My father prefers drinking tea to (drinking) coffee.
- My father prefers to drink tea rather than (drink) coffee.

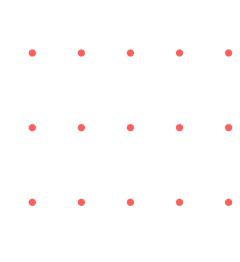

# **Present Continuous**

She is making a cake now. (present)

# **Present Perfect Continuous**

He has been making a cake for one hour.

(started in the past and it is still happening)

She has made a cake. (past)
