DEFINITION

GIVE IN

- 1) to finally agree to what someone wants, after refusing for a period of time; stop resisting Ex. After weeks of nagging, I finally gave in and got my kids a puppy.
- 2) "to turn (someone/something) in" = admit to a crime

 Ex. You need to go to the police and turn yourself in. / You need to go to the police and give yourself in.
- 3) to give or return something to someone else (usually a teacher) Ex. Turn in/Give in your papers when you finish.

GIVE IN, meaning "to stop resisting," is inseparable. However, with the meanings "admit to a crime" or "return something to someone else," it's separable.

GIVE is an irregular verb (GIVE - GAVE - GIVEN)

EXAMPLES AND EXPLANATIONS

1. Present tense

Don't give in to the temptation to be lazy! You have work to do!

2. Present continuous

Marcy is giving in to all of her toddler's demands.

• Toddler - a child that is just learning to walk (1-3 years old)

3. Past simple

When things got too difficult, Caleb finally gave in and asked for help.

too = exaggerated in a negative way

4. Past continuous + past simple

I was giving in to sleep when the teacher said the lecture would be on the test.

5. Used to + modals (would)

My children used to think that I would always give in to their demands, but they were wrong.

6. Future (will)

I will not give in to my feelings of anger. I will stay calm.

7. Present perfect or present simple

We've been on a diet for a week now, but it is still hard not to give in when we're hungry.

8. Past perfect

By the time the researcher returned, the child *had already given in* and eaten the marshmallow he **wasn't supposed to** eat.

- am/is/are supposed to (do) = am/is/are expected/obliged to do
 - o You are supposed to go to the dentist every year.
 - o It's supposed to rain this weekend.

9. Conditionals (first conditional)

If we give in and eat this cake, we'll have to go to the gym one hour earlier tomorrow.

10. Modals (would)

Belinda said she wouldn't give in no matter how much you asked her.

• no matter... = regardless (it's not going to make any difference)

o She won't marry you no matter how many times you ask her.
