DEFINITION

LOOK INTO (something) - to investigate (something)

LOOK INTO is inseparable

LOOK is a regular verb (LOOK - LOOKED - LOOKED)

EXAMPLES AND EXPLANATIONS

1. Present tense

Guards! There's a man tied up in my room! Please look into it!

- "Tie up" is another phrasal verb that means to wrap in a rope, cord, etc. It's also a common expression that means "busy and unable to leave"
 - o I'm tied up at work, so I'm going to be late for dinner. This means that I'm busy with something at work and I can't leave.

2. Present continuous

There are many police officers looking into the car crash.

3. Past simple

The doors were all locked, officer. I looked into it myself.

4. Past continuous

I told him that you were looking into that noise. Where did you go?

• "Where did you go?" Sounds like "Wheredja go?"

5. Used to

When you're the parent of a young child, you're used to looking into any suspicious silence.

6. Future (will)

I will look into your complaint immediately.

- complaint (noun) a statement about something being unsatisfactory
 - o I'd like to file a complaint about the terrible service at this restaurant.
- complain (verb) to make a statement about things being unsatisfactory; to speak negatively about something.
 - o You complain too much.

7. Present perfect continuous

The police have been looking into the kidnapping case for over a year now. They said that they won't give up until they find the missing little girl.

- kidnap to take someone against their will (more common with children, but adults can also be kidnapped)
- missing "disappeared" or "not found."
 - o I always feel sad when I see the pictures of all the missing children at the grocery story.
 - o My files are missing. Someone must have taken them!

8. Future perfect

Don't worry about the Menendez case. I'll have already looked into it for you by the time you arrive.

BY THE TIME x WHEN

- WHEN can be used in any verb tense.
- BY THE TIME is used almost always in a perfect tense.
 - o ✓ By the time I got to the party, Sam had already left. (past perfect)
 - o ✓ When I got to the party, Sam had already left. (past perfect)
 - o ✓ I was in the shower when you called. (simple past)
 - o XI was in the shower by the time you called. (simple past "by the time" cannot be used here)

9. Conditionals (third conditional)

If we hadn't looked into that strange sound, we wouldn't have discovered the cat.

10. Modals (would)

Would you mind *looking into* this? I got an email with the wrong flight information and I'd like **to make sure** everything is okay.

- Would you mind + gerund...?
 - o Would you mind turning off the air conditioner?
 - o Would you mind opening the door for me?
- to make sure = to verify; to confirm; to check on someone or something
 - o I'm going to make sure the door is locked. = I'm going to check/confirm/verify that the door is locked.
