Simple Past - regular

When do I use the simple past?

- Actions that started and <u>finished</u> in the past
- When the action happened is clear (yesterday, "x time" ago, last/past time: 2 weeks ago, last month, past summer)
- Old news
- Things cannot change

The majority of verbs, called **Regular verbs**, follow standard patterns in their inflection and create the past simple and the past participle using the same word ending, -ed.

-ed ending

base form + ed

I worked yesterday.

He played videogame after school.

They traveled to Egypt in their honeymoon.

base form + d (verbs finishing in "e")

She danced ballet last night.

He decided to buy a new computer.

base form -y + ied (verbs ending in consonant + "y", remove "y")

We studied English last week.

She cried so much watching that movie.

base form + last consonant + **ed** (verbs ending in consonant vowel consonant, where the <u>stress</u> is in the last syllable, we double the last consonant)

After 3 hours, they stop**ped** their car to eat. John prefer**red** pizza to pasta.

Affirmative

I played the guitar for five years.

He cooked dinner after work.

subj + verb (simple past)

Negative

I didn't play the guitar for five years.

He didn't cook dinner after work.

subj + didn't / did not + verb (base form)

Interrogative

Did you play the guitar for five years. Did he cook dinner after work. What did she watch on TV last night? WH + did + subj +verb (base form)?

Summarizing

You will **only** use the verbs in the *simple past* form when the sentences are **affirmative!**
