MÓDULO 05 - TAKE OFF

DEFINITION

To take off -

- 1) to remove (something);
- 2) to go into the air/to leave the ground
 - TAKE OFF is SEPARABLE when it means "to remove"
 - TAKE OFF is INSEPARABLE when it means "to go into the air"/ "to leave the ground"
 - TAKE is IRREGULAR

TAKE - TOOK - TAKEN

EXAMPLES AND EXPLANATIONS

1) To remove (something)

1. Present tense + modal verb (must)

You must never take off your helmet when you are in space!

- Use the preposition IN to say "inside" a specific place or an area
 - o Many different types of plants and animals live in the Amazon Rainforest.
 - o There are many fish in the sea.

2. Present continuous

Michelle is over there, taking off her coat.

- over there/here gives emphasis to the location when someone is far away or the object that they are looking for is far away
 - o Where's my cellphone? It's over there on the table.
 - o Get over here right now! (can be used with "here" in commands)
- right there/here used when the person is close to the object they are looking for or the object is clearly visible (bem aqui; bem aí)
 - o It's right here. It's in front of me. (clearly visible)
 - o I'll be right there. I'll be there (next to you).

3. Present simple + past simple

Your sister is **on** the **balcony**. She *took* her hat *off* and **put it on** the **counter**.

- Use the preposition ON with surfaces
 - o There is a sign on the door that says, "no soliciting."
 - o We put ornaments on the Christmas tree.
- Balcony = sacada (balcony and "balcão" are false cognates)
- · Counter = balcão
- Put on = a phrasal verb that means "place clothing/jewelry/etc. on your body or another place" or "make a device operate" (turn on).
 - o Put your shoes on.
 - o I put the plates and silverware on the table.
 - o Should I put on some music? = (Should I turn on some music?)

4. Past continuous + past simple

Carmen was taking off her sunglasses and accidentally dropped them.



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5. Used to (+ be used to/get used to do)

When my grandparents moved to Japan, they had to get used to taking their shoes off before entering a house.

2) To go into the air/leave the ground

6. Future (will)

According to the lady at the information counter, the plane will take off in an hour.

- at -specific location
 - o I'm at work/home/school.
- in a time frame
 - o Mary said that she'll be here in about 5 minutes.

7. Present perfect

This new project has really taken off in our department. I'm stoked!

stoked – excited ("pumped")

8. Future perfect

This traffic is terrible! The plane will have taken off by the time we get to the airport!

- get arrive
 - o How do you get to work?
 - I take the bus.

9. Conditionals (should)

Our plane should take off in two hours if everything is all right.

10. Modals (could)

This new product is so cutting-edge, it could really take off with the teen crowd!

cutting-edge = new technology
